We are well into the season of Lent by now, working the work of a much more somber liturgy than we do in Ordinary Time. I remember an English cartoon book by a fellow who went by the pen name "Brother Cholerick" whose tart reminders of the foibles and foolishness of the religious were literally a scream. One of the cartoons depicted a procession of dour faced sisters on their way to chapel. The caption read, "O happy Lent".

I know that reminders of our sinful condition are not always appreciated and I have been known to remind myself and others that we are not allowed to confess other peoples' sins. On the other hand, the way to a happy Lent is to remember our sins to the Lord in humble confession so that he will, as the scripture promises us in Hebrews 8:12, remember them no more. Our sins, faults and failures and foibles are the occasion for God to display his outrageous and unreasonable love for us, his sinful creatures.

I see no reason why we may not keep a joyful Lent. Whatever mess I have fallen into, God is there to rescue me: "Your faithful love toward me is awesome and because you've rescued my life from the lowest part of hell." There is no hell deeper than God's love, no place that is beyond the reach of his loving embrace. Facing up to our sins pulls us out of the ditch we are in and puts us on the road again.

The phrase that appears in lyric form in the old Latin version sung formerly in the Exsultet of the Easter Vigil: "O felix culpa quae talem et tantum meruit habere redemptorem," "O happy fault that merited such and so great a Redeemer," offers us a window into the great mystery of God's love. God's love is not inhibited by our sins or exalted by our virtues. His love is universal and unconditional. By the offering of his Son, he welcomes us to grace and entices us to live a holy life because it is the pathway to peace and joy.

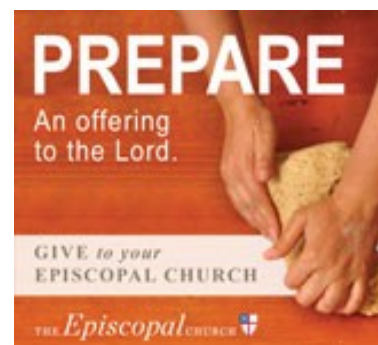
As St. Paul warned us, "What shall we say then? Shall we continue in sin, that grace may abound? God forbid. How shall we, that are dead to sin, live any longer therein?" We can't just do as we please as we did before we knew the grace of God, presuming upon God's forgiveness. By our baptism we are dead to all that and risen with Christ to walk in a new life.

The fasting, the giving and the prayers of our Lenten discipline are aimed like a laser at the resurrected life. They are intended to make more of us than we ever imagined. The fruits of these efforts draw us to together in a common hunger for both the earthly and the heavenly delights of Easter.

So let us keep a happy Lent and arrive together at the joy unspeakable and full of glory.

SUNDAYS, MARCH 3, 10 and 17 – Regular Eucharist with Lenten liturgy and service music. The Senior Choir will sing special anthems each Sunday relating to the readings appointed for that day.

SUNDAY, MARCH 24 is Palm Sunday – This marks the beginning of Holy Week, a time of special services, litanies and music. The Palm Sunday Litany will begin in the church courtyard and then the congregation will triumphantly proceed into the church, led by trumpeter Danny Acidera. Our choir anthem gives everyone a chance to wave their palms.

*******THURSDAY, MARCH 28 is Maundy Thursday** - The 7:00 p.m. Eucharist will feature the washing of feet as mandated by Christ to his disciples. The Senior Choir will sing special music for this meditative service.

*******FRIDAY, MARCH 29 is Good Friday** – The 7:00 p.m. service will feature the traditional hymns and music for this somber Eucharist. The Senior Choir will lead the music for the liturgy and sing special anthems and responses. We will strip the altar and leave in silence.

*******SATURDAY, MARCH 30 is the Easter Vigil** - This 8:00 p.m. Eucharist marks the beginning of the festive Easter Season, with the new fire of life! Our organist will be Clay Logue from Holy Innocents. Though there is no choir, there will be plenty of singing as we tell the story of God's people.

SUNDAY, MARCH 31 is EASTER – Two morning services will celebrate the Resurrection of Christ. The 8:30 a.m. Eucharist will begin with prelude music played by our bell choir. Come early so you can hear their beautiful music. BRING YOUR OWN BELLS also so you can ring them during the hymns. The second service is at 11:00 a.m. and will feature music by the Praise Band.

A CUP OF COLD WATER COMMUNITY CARE VAN OUTREACH MINISTRY

Aloha everyone! During the past few months, Mary Lou Mellinger of the Good Shepherd Church outreach committee has organized and enthusiastically worked with a small group of Episcopal Churches leaders & members from St. John's Church, Trinity by the Sea, Holy Innocents and Good Shepherd to begin to lay the foundation for the implementation of a new shared ministry on Maui using an "old fashioned" human needs outreach as a cornerstone to service the poor and needy in our community by delivering basic food, hygiene, medical and clothing item through a roving Care Van.

A few years ago I began to develop a *risk taking* Care Van outreach plan that would be shared between the four Maui Episcopal Churches which would serve their respective wider communities on a weekly basis by seeking out the needy and by having designated locations where the Care Van may become a distribution point to meet basic human needs.

I have now finished giving presentations to our four Episcopal Church vestries and recently completed a telephone conference call with Bishop Fitzpatrick. We have been given formal support by the bishop's office to launch this new ministry. I will also be talking personally to church members from all four churches *to determine if we can gain enough volunteer support to operate the van*. Involvement in the Care Van vision can include prayer, donating items such as food, clothing, hygiene kits, a band aid or rubba slippers! It can include helping to stock the van on its designated operating day, preparing the van with supplies, cleaning the van, supporting Care Van fundraisers, or riding in the van as a volunteer team member or "run leader".

Bishop Fitzpatrick has approved that a formal Board of Officers and members be designated which will be officially called, "A Cup of Cold Water, A Community Care Van". This outreach will initially start out as a program under the Hawaii Episcopal Diocese which is lead & operated by the Maui Episcopal Churches. It will also be assigned to either the Diocese's: Commission on Mission beyond the Church and/or the Commission on shared ministries.

There are several details that must be worked out, to

include grant applications, fundraising, training, insurance (now can be covered under the diocesan umbrella), service and "run" locations, scheduling, van purchase, supplies etc. However the key and crucial first step is to determine if we as a church collective can support this ministry through prayer, volunteering and financial gifting. We wish to extend the blessing of our Ohana Kitchen outreach feeding efforts and take the love of our Episcopal Churches UNITED on the road. We want to continue to find *old, new, tried and true, untried and risky outreach ministries* and help us continue in our faith journey by taking the torch of our baptismal covenant forward to *seek and serve* those less fortunate.



Our "A Cup of Cold Water Community Care Van Board" is currently made up of Father Marvin Foltz (GSC), Father Austin Murray (Trinity), Mother Linda Decker (GSC), Senior Warden Peter Lee (GSC), John Decker (GSC, treasurer), Mary Lou Mellinger (GSC, secretary), Senior Warden Jean Fiddes (St. Johns, public relations), Paula Baldwin (Prayer leader warrior, board

member, Trinity). Father Bill Albinger of Holy Innocents has also been apprised of our efforts as well as Senior Warden's Cordy McLaughlin from Trinity by the Sea and Senior Warden Donna Tarsitano of Holy Innocents. I have committed three years to the program as the Head Coordinator and President of the Board. (Our goal will be to rotate the head coordinator role between the four churches)

RECENT UPDATES:

Trinity by the Sea's Junior Warden Jay Jackson has volunteered to be the Team Leader for their church. We are seeking a Team leader from Good Shepherd and St. John's Churches. (YOU?)

A "Cup of Cold Water" checking account is currently being set up as I write, in that we can begin to start accepting donations. Holy Innocents has already pledged \$1,000.00 to the new ministry and others have already made financial commitments.

Good Shepherd Churches Episcopal Church Women under the direction of Louise Aloy have pledged their full support and we will be seeking funding from the National United Thank Offering.

Adopt-A-Family update

It is with a cheerful heart to report that the Good Shepherd Women was able to fulfill two goals set forth for the year 2012 as they have in the past few years.

In June 2012, a Summer Fun'd Fair took place and proceeds helped accomplish both goals. We bought back to school "core" supplies for than 50 children at the Wailuku homeless shelter. A list was given to us with ages from pre-K to a senior in high school and supplies were purchased and issued just before school started to all of the children at the shelter. From crayons to pens and filler paper to composition tablets, we purchased as many items we could that were on sale at WalMart and got our monies worth to share with these children. About \$300 worth of school supplies were purchased from the proceeds.

During the holidays, in the month of December, we were very honored to have had the opportunity to bless three families. On December 23rd, Cora was able to present a monetary gift to a family whose wife/mother stricken with a rare form of cancer needed to fly to the mainland in hopes to receive treatment. She was very touched by our kindness and thoughtfulness. They were able to find a Dr. who would see a few days after Christmas day on the mainland so they had to travel on Christmas Day.

Our second family is a single mother with a 5 year old daughter who is juggling motherhood, working and going to school to better herself. I met her on Christmas morning at church to present her with a gift card for Foodland and a couple of wrapped gifts for her daughter and herself. She too was very touched by the generosity and kindness shown them. I invited her to come to church and send her daughter to Sunday School. She said would like that but will have to check her schedule.

Our third family that was helped were really surprised and appreciative of the gifts and food certificate. The grandparents are raising the children because the parents are both challenged by drug addiction. The family is really struggling financially. Marylou presented this family on Christmas Eve with our gifts.

We ask for continued prayers for all 3 families into the New Year.

Sesquicentennial Celebration ~ A Rookie Shepherd Blessed

It is truly an honor to have served as Shepherd to Presiding Bishop Katharine Jefferts-Schori and husband, Dr. Richard Schori, during the Sesquicentennial Celebration from November 9-11, 2012.

I had been anticipating this weekend for a very long time, well over a year. I was very worried and concerned at times that I would oversleep or get her schedule mixed up or get lost driving in Honolulu. I reviewed the weekend events over and over and over again. I had notes all over the place, in a notebook, on my Blackberry, on post it notes and on my Samsung tablet. I wanted everything to go perfect and prayed feverishly daily that all would go well. I rehearsed in my mind the streets and avenues from the hotel to the cathedral, to the Pacific Club, to Washington Place and so forth. I even woke up at the crack of dawn on Friday morning and drove to the cathedral for a test run. It has been a while since I drove in Honolulu so I wanted to make certain I would not get lost.



I attended General Convention in 2009 in Anaheim, and again in 2012 in Indianapolis as a Deputy. I passed her many times in the halls between the HOB (House of Bishops) and the HOD (House of Deputies), going to church, committee hearings and even in hotel breezeways. But never in my dreams did I feel I could be by her side to care for her needs and get to know her a little better until this special 150 year celebration for the Diocese of Hawai'i. Going back a few years in 2006, I was at the ECW Triennial Meeting in Columbus, Ohio when she was elected. It was a very exciting time for all of us. I still have a button that reads, "It's a girl!" that was given to me while the bells were ringing throughout the convention hall. What a joyous occasion! A couple of years passed and I attended the Anglican Indigenous Network conference in Vancouver, Canada. Presiding Bishop Katharine was in attendance as well. Delegates from 5 nations were present and each day we ate our meals together, including Presiding Bishop Katharine. I was thrilled to be in her presence and always remained in awe when she spoke.

I was up at 5:30 am each morning to go over the schedule for the day, reviewing when and what time she needed to be where and who was she supposed to meet. By now, I had the entire weekend schedule memorized. I even had a cheat sheet in the car. While I was anxiously awaiting the first order for the day, she had already begun her day jogging between 6:00 am and 6:30 am. When we finally met up, she wanted to walk to the cathedral and all 3 of us embarked on a wonderful ten minute journey. We chatted about all sorts of things while walking to and from the cathedral. I was immediately put at ease by her down to earth personality along with her gentle and compassionate voice. She had a keen ear when I shared many things about the Hawaiian Culture and the various islands with her. As the day passed into evening and there were more events to attend, I felt so blessed to be able to assist her in any way possible. She was always very courteous and only spoke kindness from her heart. She was very comfortable to talk to and with, and never once placed any demands. She was so easy to please and I wanted even more so to be able to take care of whatever it was that she may need or want. Instead, she would ask me if it was okay with me to walk or what I would rather do. She would go along with my decision. It was a wonderful feeling to have her ask me if I was comfortable and okay.

The weekend was going by much too quickly. After a very long day and evening on Friday, Saturday was already calling for more events. Fortunately, there was some down time in the afternoon and she wanted to take care of business and prepare for Sunday's sermon as well. On Saturday evening, she truly enjoyed the music of the 'Iolani High School band and a Taste of Honolulu, so to speak, with all the different Pacific Rim dishes being served. She enjoyed the festive concept and was thrilled to be greeted by so many people.

Sunday morning came and I wanted to be a Great Shepherd so I hung out with her until she processed into the cathedral, she was the last one in line, go figure! I thought she should have been the first in line and she kept telling me to go into the church but I wanted to make sure she was okay. She had asked me the day before what could she do with all her leis. She towed a very large plastic bag filled with all of the leis that were given to her over the last couple of days from the hotel as we walked on Bishop Street that morning

Anglican Prayer Beads—ECW

One of life's greatest mysteries is the power of prayer. Used for intimacy with God, it is said to be life altering. The healing power of prayer reaches across science to a place of calm and peace in the human heart and spirit.

Saturday, January 26, 2012, seven women gathered in the parish hall to learn how to make an Anglican prayer bead. It was the year 2003 that I attended a workshop at the ECW Triennial Conference in Minneapolis, Minnesota and learned how to make one. I have been praying each morning with my prayer beads and have made many to share with those that are not able to attend church for whatever reason.

There is no incorrect way to pray! You may use prayers from the Bible, The Book of Common Prayer or the Hymnal or you may create your own personal prayers. Today Anglican prayer beads, also known as the Anglican Rosary, are widely used. These prayer beads originated from the Marian rosary and the Orthodox Jesus Prayer Rope. Over time, prayer beads evolved into the sacred familiar circles we know today.

I was amazed at how easy it was to make and more importantly, I was fascinated by the significance of each bead. The prayer bead circle has four

groups of seven beads called week beads. Seven represents the number of days it took God to create the world. The four larger beads are called cruciforms and they represent the four points of the cross.

Directly above the cross is the invitational bead which invites us to worship God. The cross reminds each of us to take up our own "cross" and follow Jesus in his example of helping others. All together there are thirty-three beads which is the number of years Jesus lived.

There are many websites on line that offer instructions and even kits to purchase. I have held 3 workshops so far and everyone that have attended, created beautiful pieces.

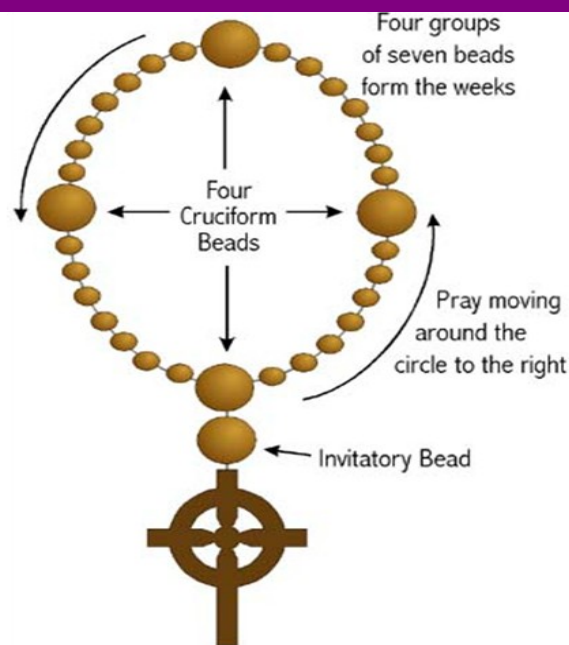
