As I was waiting for Carl to finish Bell Choir practice, I heard a familiar tune emerging from the melody and chords. Back in the day, as they say, the youth choir used to belt out this simple anthem. In recent years we have been without a cohesive youth choir, and I
 sadly miss them.

On the Day of Pentecost, the Senior Choir will take up this anthem again, accompanied by the bells. I can hardly wait. Music doesn't have to be difficult or complicated to speak to us. Some of us reluctantly offer our voices. Others join the lusty chorus, singing out with no shame.

I was so pleased when a group stepped forward to join in the Holy Week and Easter choir. Others have additional talents that are needed, both in the choir and in the Praise and Worship Band. We need basses and altos, but we also need instrumentalists and dancers. We need acolytes, readers of Scripture, prayer leaders and Eucharistic ministers and visitors.

The season of Easter is salted with Scriptures that speak of the wind of the Spirit. In the Hebrew language the same word "ruach" serves as "wind", "breath" and "Spirit". The prophet Ezekiel in the Vigil lessons prophesies to the wind and the dry bones come together, bone to his bone, flesh rises and the Spirit enters reconstituted humanity and reanimates us. The opening of Genesis has the "ruach Elohim" brooding over the face of the waters of the deep, hovering like a great bird over the primordial chaos, stirring the pot of creation. The gospel on "Low Sunday" describes Jesus as breathing the Holy Spirit into his dispirited disciples, sending us in his name and granting us the power and responsibility to forgive sins.

Finally on the great day, the upper room day, the gathered disciples feel the wind again and are touched by fire. Easter begins and ends with fire, but that is another theme. The Spirit blows our way in the Holy Season.

# A Cup of Cold Water (CCW), A Community Care Van Outreach of the Episcopal Church on Maui 

## April 2013 Update:

Aloha Friends! It's been a busy February and March for the cup of Cold Water Board members and friends. We continue to move forward in an orderly fashion and don't want to rush into anything, as it is our goal to establish an enduring local outreach on Maui that will symbolize the Love and Compassion of the Episcopal Church on Maui. We want this outreach to be fun, filled with adventure, Christian love \& optimism! Our efforts continue:

We have a separate temporary account set up to receive any financial gifting specifically for the Cup of Cold water at Good Shepherd Church. Checks may be written to "Good Shepherd Church- Cup of Cold Water". Any amount is appreciated to help us get off the ground and running. Please think of us in at your churches plate offering. Checks may also be sent to: Good Shepherd Church, A Cup of Cold Water, 2140 Main Street, Wailuku, HI 96793.
We have designated a parking stall for the van, along with a storage area for our stocking \& distribution items at Good Shepherd Church.

We continue to ask each church or church member to begin to stock key distribution items to include new caps, headwear, rubber slippers, light jackets, bottled water, sunscreen, band aides, toothbrushes, toothpaste (small tubes), small soaps, alcohol wipes, good condition bibles or new testaments and non perishable food items.

In March, we had our first gathering of interested and committed volunteers at Good Shepherd Church, with 20 plus attendees \& board members. We talked about the basic outreach plan and went over the first print of our CCW operations manual.

We have scheduled our first two training blocs for the CCW volunteers which includes, Safeguarding Gods Children, Thursday April 11th @ 5:00 pm, Good Shepherd Church and the cCW volunteer "boot camp" training on Saturday May 4th a 0800 am, Good Shepherd Church. We have also locked in Saturday June 8 th at St. John's in Kula for our cCW Sexual misconduct training. This training session is also open to all church members. Further details will follow.

We await word on the funding for the Care Van from the National Episcopal Churches UTO grant Committee. It is expected that we will know if we are gifted monies no later than the end of May 2013. Please pray for us.

CCW Secretary Mary Lu Mellinger continues to keep us focused and on task, by communicating with all of the volunteers \& board members updating CCW related contact lists, coordinating Board monthly meetings, working on our newly envisioned CCW brochure and other logistics.
Special mahalo to Mark sitts from Good Shepherd Church has been supporting the outreach with idea's, planning and leadership.

We wish to extend a deep mahalo to Cindy \& Paul Schumacher of St. John's church for their support and encouragement. As most of you know, Cindy writes for the Maui Weekly and she gave our fledgling outreach and our Episcopal ohana some appreciated coverage. Mahalo Cindy!
I attended the first Maui Homeless Alliance meeting at the MEO building in Wailuku and we have begun to network with the current group of volunteers. I must admit, one of my thoughts was: "Why isn't a representative or two from every Christian church here?"

During the month of April, myself and others, will be doing scouting and drive-bys throughout Maui as we begin to develop our basic run routes for our back yard mission work. Flexibility will also be important here.

So we build slowly, we build from the bottom, we build with a few volunteers from our own church pews, other churches and other community friends, we will start slow, we will drive slow, we look and seek for the poor, we will take the time to remember, we take the time to love a few folks in our own neighborhood. We take the time to remember how lucky and blessed we are.

# Hui Pu 2013: "Breaking New Ground"

Not sure what to do with your summer? How about a great camp experience connecting with God and God's beautiful Creation? Hui Pu at Camp Mokule'ia is one thing you will not want to miss! This camp was designed with youth in mind and gives participants the opportunity to experience God through nature and camping while developing friendships and bonds that will last a lifetime. The programming includes such activities as a ropes course, beach art, night fishing, hikes, scavenger hunts, and much, much more, all while developing and fostering faith and spirituality and embracing Hawaiian culture and beauty. Youth will explore different ways of worship through music and art and friendships.
The theme for 2013 is "Breaking New Ground", and it is guaranteed to be an unforgettable event. As the premiere year of this new camp experience at Mokule'ia, the new camp committee has worked hard to plan for a great summer experience. This year, as we begin new traditions and ideas, we will offer two sessions of camp. The first session, called 'Opio (meaning youth) is for students entering grades 9-12, and will be from July $5-11$. The cost for the 'Opio camp is $\$ 300$. The younger group, called Lokahi (meaning unity), and entering grades 4-8, will be a three day camp this year Friday to Sunday, July 12-14, and is $\$ 150$. It is the hope that next year both camps will be a full week, and the camp will continue to grow and flourish for many years to come.

KOKUA COUNSELORS: We also have an opportunity for up to 8 youth from the older 'Opio group, to become Kokua, similar to junior counselors, for the younger session of camp. Applicants should be entering grades 10-12, and interested in leadership and role modeling for younger youth. Please mark your interest in applying for this role in the registration process, and an application will be sent to you. Leadership training is already planned into the programming of the 'Opio camp. Kokua will stay the entire time of camp, as participants the first week, then serving as leaders for the Lokahi session, with more team bonding and leadership training immediately prior to the Lokahi session.
