"Keep on loving each other as brothers and sisters. Do not forget to entertain strangers for by so doing some people have entertained angels."

- Hebrews 13:1.2

Something happened this past month which I found very moving. I received a text from a number that I did not recognize. It was followed by a phone call from an Episcopal priest in California. He had just heard that, tragically, one of his parishioners had just died. The man was on



vacation with his wife and family to attend a family wedding on Maui. He was found in the water and drowned. The priest had found me by googling episcopal priests on Maui, found my phone number and reached out to me.

The result was that I was able to visit and pray with the bereaved family just hours after they were facing the devastation of a tragic and untimely death.

I felt incredibly fortunate to be a follower of Jesus. Where else in our world can a stranger reach out to another stranger to bring comfort to another stranger, 3,000 miles away for no other reason than that we are all followers of Jesus?

Our baptismal certificates do not come with small print on the back that says "... the baptized has the right to expect emergency pastoral care on a world wide basis at any time with 4 hours notice." We do, however, promise to "... seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself".

The gift and the potential of the church is this rich tradition of care. It is at its most powerful when it is an everyday spiritual practice, where the people of God look out for each other, encourage each other and visit each other. Sometimes it is casual and powerful, where we receive the kindness of strangers. At other times it is intentional and organized. And at

others missional, where we seek out the hurting and seek

to minister to them.

It is also evangelism; finding that God brings someone into your life at just the right moment to heal and encourage is a powerful testimony of God in the world. Jesus gave us a strange power. He said that we have "...the power to bind up and to loose". Let us pray that Good Shepherd will grow and be all that it can be in binding up and setting free the people of God.

But in order to respond we also need to know. In emergency, call the church and at the end of the message you will find Fr. Craig's cell number at the end of the voicemail message.

### **Feast of The Holy Sovereigns**

Kamehameha 'Iolani (Feb. 9, 1834-Nov. 30, 1863) and Emma (Jan. 2, 1836-Apr. 25, 1885), were King and Queen of Hawai'i. Kamehameha IV became the King of Hawaii on Jan. 11, 1855. On June 19, 1856, he married Emma Rooke and she became Queen Consort. In 1860 they asked the Bishop of Oxford to send missionaries to The Kingdom of Hawaii to establish the Church of England (Anglican Church). On Oct. 11, 1862, Bishop Thomas N. Staley and two priests arrived in Hawai'i. The King and Queen were confirmed in the Anglican Church on Nov. 28, 1862. Their son and only child was born on May 20, 1858, but died on Aug. 27, 1862. This tragic death broke the king's heart, and he died shortly thereafter. Queen Emma declined to continue to rule and devoted herself to good works. It was under these two sovereigns that Anglicanism was established in Hawaii. They are commemorated in the Calendar of Saints of the Episcopal Church every year on Nov. 28. With the Anglican (now Episcopal) Church's established here in 1862, King

Kamehameha IV and Queen Emma, who was a lifelong Anglican, wholeheartedly supported and nurtured the Church throughout the islands with gifts of land, including the founding the Cathedral of St. Andrew in Honolulu and parishes on all islands. They are our very own "Holy Sovereigns" and are among the patrons of the Episcopal Diocese of Hawai'i. It is our custom and tradition to commemorate and celebrate them every year, with a Solemn and Festive Ka Eukalikia Hemolele; The Holy Eucharist, with the Royal Societies attending in full regalia. This year's Celebration will be on Sunday, November 25th at 9 a.m. Please make it a great celebration and liturgy with your thankful, humble and faithful presence.

### **Christmas Pageant Preparations and Advent Fellowship Hour**

It is almost time to break out the angels, shepherds and Holy Family costumes! The Formation committee has started plans for our annual Christmas Pageant which is the feature of our 6:00 pm Family Christmas Eve service. The rehearsals in the past have been during Sunday school, but this year they have big plans for the Godly Play Advent lessons. So this year the pageant rehearsals will be after the 9:00 am service in the hall.


Bring gardening tools: clippers, pruners, weed digger/puller, gloves, a stool to sit on, knee pads...

Lessons and Carols is coming up again. I have been talking with a few parishioners who have indicated that they would like to help support this ministry financially. We thought that we should extend an invitation to parishioners to consider becoming patrons of Lessons and Carols.

This is our third annual Lessons and Carols. It is on the last Wednesday before Christmas, on December 19th, 2019. Bob Wills, the director of the Maui Chamber Orchestra has already started putting together a choir and program for this transcendent worship service that so exemplifies the Anglican tradition.

From previous years we have some ideas to promote the event further and to make it more successful as an outreach.

We are going to be placing an ad in the Maui Chamber Orchestra Christmas program for Lessons and Carols. This will give us access to a specialized audience who are likely to want to attend. There has been considerable "word of mouth" buzz on this service and we hope that this year that we will be spared foul weather and see it reach its potential.

We are inviting parishioners to become patrons of the event. We will be printing a list of patrons in the program, much like arts organizations do elsewhere. ### Diocesan Bible Study to Prepare for the Presiding Bishop's Visit to the Diocese in March 2019

The Most Reverend Michael Curry, the Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church, will be with us in the Diocese of Hawai'i on March 22-24, 2019. Please mark your calendars particularly for Friday (March 22), Saturday (March 23) and Sunday (March 24). More information about the visit will be forthcoming. I pray this will be a time of renewal in the Diocese.

To prepare for the Presiding Bishop's visit, I invite all members of the Diocese to prepare for a time of prayer and study of Scripture. I specifically want us to study and pray through the Gospel of Matthew from Monday, October 15, 2018, through Thursday, March 21, 2019.

A schedule to read through the Gospel over the course of those 158 days (excluding Saturdays and Sundays, as well as Thanksgiving and Christmas) may be found on the diocesan website: http://www.episcopalhawaii.org/bishops-bible-study.html

I particularly call us to a method of Bible reflection called Lectio Divina ("divine reading"). Though a very old prayer practice, I have been using Praying Scripture for a Change: An Introduction to Lectio Divina by Tim Gray (Ascension Press, 2009) as a guide (page numbers noted below are from this book). I do need to note that Gray is a conservative Roman Catholic and some of his insights may not be helpful in our context. The method suggested, however, can be valuable.

Though other translations of the Holy Scripture can certainly be used for this prayer, I encourage you to consider the Common English Bible (CEB) translation (http://www.commonenglishbible.com). In the Scripture schedule below, there is link each day to the lesson of the day at the CEB in the Bible Gateway Online Bible (https://www.biblegateway.com).

### The Five Steps of Lectio Divina

1) This is the first step, called 'Lectio' ("reading"). For this first step, read the passage as if you've never read/heard the story before. You might even consider reading the passage out loud. Carefully and slowly read through each sentence and try to notice different words or phrases as they jump out to you. As Gray suggests, "As you begin lectio, then take a moment to ask God to help you switch off the cell phone in your soul" (page 44).

2) The second step called 'Meditatio' ("meditation"). Read the scripture passage again, and take a few minutes to sit and be in that moment. Imagine you're in the story. Who are you in the story? What are your senses? What does it look like? Can you hear anything? How are the people in the scene feeling? How do you feel when people speak or act? Pray through what you experience and let God speak to you. It's a lot more about listening than about talking, and about seeing what God wants to show you. What is it like to experience Jesus' presence, words, or actions? How do you react? What goes on in your heart? What prayer is on your heart? As Gray reminds us, "In contrast to meditation techniques aimed at emptying the mind, Christian meditation makes full use of the intellect in an effort to understand God's Word and to hear God's voice" (page 62).

For those who would like an aid with the readings and *Meditatio*, I suggest a two-volume commentary/reflection from Anglican Bishop N.T. Wright: *Matthew for Everyone: Part 1, Chapters 1-15* (Westminister/John Knox Press, 2004) and *Matthew for Everyone: Part 2, Chapters 16-28* (Westminister/John Knox Press, 2004). These books include the full text of the readings from Matthew's Gospel with the Bishop's comments on each passage.

3) The third step is 'Oratio' ("prayer"). Read through the scripture again, slowly lingering on each verse. Now, offer to God the prayer of your heart. It's time to pray it, to turn it towards God and respond. The emotions and thoughts that have come out of meditation move us into authentic prayer - conversation with God. Your prayer doesn't have to look any particular way. Share with God whatever is on your heart. If you're struggling to pray, tell God and ask for help. "The key is to remain in relationship



with God as you mull connections and implications your meditation on Scripture has for your life and for the lives around you" (page 79).

- 4) Read the passage again and then it's time for 'Contemplatio' ("contemplation"). This is a heavy word that really just means to sit and reflect. Take a few minutes to sit quietly with God. What was shown to you? What did you say to God? Be calm and listen. Something you might like to do is journal or make a note in the margin of your Bible so that your thoughts/feelings don't get lost once you're back out in daily life.
- 5) Gray adds a fifth step to the traditional *Lectio Divina: 'Operatio'* ("work" or "action"). Here you can consider how our time with the Scripture will impact our practice as a follower of Jesus Christ. Is there something from the day's Scripture reading and time of prayer that leads you to a particular action or behavior (or change in behavior) that can be engaged today? This, too, is something you might like to record in a journal or the margin of your Bible.
