## GOOD SHEPHERD EPISCOPAL CHURCH

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SEPTEMBER–OCTOBER 2012

I returned from the General Convention on July 16 with a fresh sense of joy in being a member of the Episcopal Church. The tremendous amount of challenging and sometimes controversial work that we were able to accomplish in such a short time was breathtaking. Better yet was the courtesy and order with which the work was conducted. We dealt with resolutions ranging from the importance of baptism before receiving communion, to the importance of confirmation, to making liturgies for the blessing of same sex couples, to prayers of consolation at the death of beloved pets. We had deep differences, but a renewed commitment to our common life.



Perhaps, most importantly, we began to look seriously at the bureaucratic structures of the church and tried to imagine a different church, one more realistic in its approach to its mission and ministry, more effective in its communications and most of all more focused on its primary tasks.

The budget for the national church this year was quite challenging and controversial, with alternate and competing budgets emerging from the Presiding Bishop's Office and the Executive Council. As a means to begin to sort this realignment of power a wise decision was taken. We began to organize the budget around the Five Marks of Anglican Mission. They are:

- ~ To proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom
- ~ To teach, baptize and nurture new believers
- ~ To respond to human need by loving service
- ~ To seek to transform unjust structures of society
- ~ To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth

I was assigned to monitor the work of the Evangelism Legislative Committee. I went into the process imagining a tedious and bloated process of deliberation, but found instead young and old, experienced and novice deputies testifying in favor of programs and policies designed to reach out to new and under served communities with the gospel.

From our diocese, the Reverend David Jackson was elected to served on the Search Committee for the next Presiding Bishop and Ryan Kusumoto, grandson of our friend, Arthur Kusumoto, was elected as youngest ever member of the board of the Church Pension Group.

I recommend to anyone concerned with the welfare of the greater church to attend a Convention. Although we only elect eight deputies and eight alternates, one can attend as a visitor, a member of official Youth Presence, as a representative of a ministry and even as a press representative. A former priest of our diocese, Kate Lewis, is a leader among those who coordinate the volunteers and pages.

I hope to share more of this experience with any interested persons. Give me a call.

## Caregiver Stress

As our community ages and individuals live longer, caring for an aging parent, becomes more of a reality in our families. Caregiving can put a strain on the relationships in our families. Paula Spencer Scott, a senior editor at Caring.com, suggests what she calls “protective buffers” to relieve caregiving stress:

1. Consciously decide that your other relationships matter: In caregiving, know that you only have so much time, love and energy to give. Spread it out among all your family relationships and invite others to give care along with you.
2. Create rituals you can share together: Create small events that the one you give care to and your other loved ones can look forward to and celebrate. Certainly birthdays and other anniversary events can be celebrated. If your loved one cannot come to church, ask for communion to be brought to your house. All can then pray together.
3. Force yourself to “stay in the game”: Continue with your other interests in life, which means that you should not be the only one giving care. Family members can relieve each other so that all of you can still have your hobbies and social activities planned around caregiving. In other words, don’t “burn out”. Pace yourself with caregiving so that you don’t see it as drudgery or torture.
4. Have an outlet to vent your frustrations: Someone in your circle of friends can be your “counselor”, so that you can talk about your frustrations and problems. Join a Caregiver Support Group. Ask for help, even within your own family.
5. Realize that Caregiving can be difficult and that there are others like you: Here is where a Caregiver Support Group can help. Be sure to talk about the tasks with other family members. Reach out for help; to the parish, to senior-serving agencies, to your best friend.
6. There will be disagreements in caregiving. So “agree to disagree”: Everyone will have an opinion about caregiving or especially YOUR caregiving. Seek mediation from the parish or from an mediation service. Call a Family Meeting to talk about your opinions and see if some of these are really “good ideas”.
7. You can only do so much: Know your limits as an individual. If there is a big problem that can’t be solved, then move on and find a solution elsewhere. Sometimes, in order to give care, one has to look elsewhere, even if it means that you will lose the relationship of a loved one, of a good friend or of an advisor. Sometimes, who you thought was your friend, drops you as a friend because of your caregiving. There are others who care for you, even in the parish, including our Pastoral Care Committee.

We were treated to chocolate haupia with whipped cream sprinkled with coconut flakes. He also shared a brief history of our benefactors and how he has lineage to our Holy Sovereigns.



Rheena Campbell, Ashley Acidera, and Mary Grace Basig taught us a hula to the lyrics of Kanaka Wai Wai. With a lot of practice, we're hoping to dance it for the Sesquicentennial celebration on September 8<sup>th</sup>.

The last night, Wednesday, June 27<sup>th</sup> Auntie Louise and Auntie Jackie taught us how to make ti leaf leis. Auntie Louise had a beautiful display of kukui nuts, feather, and ribbon and yarn leis. She shared a story on each lei and how she acquired each one.

# Summer Reading Program – Four Weeks of Fun

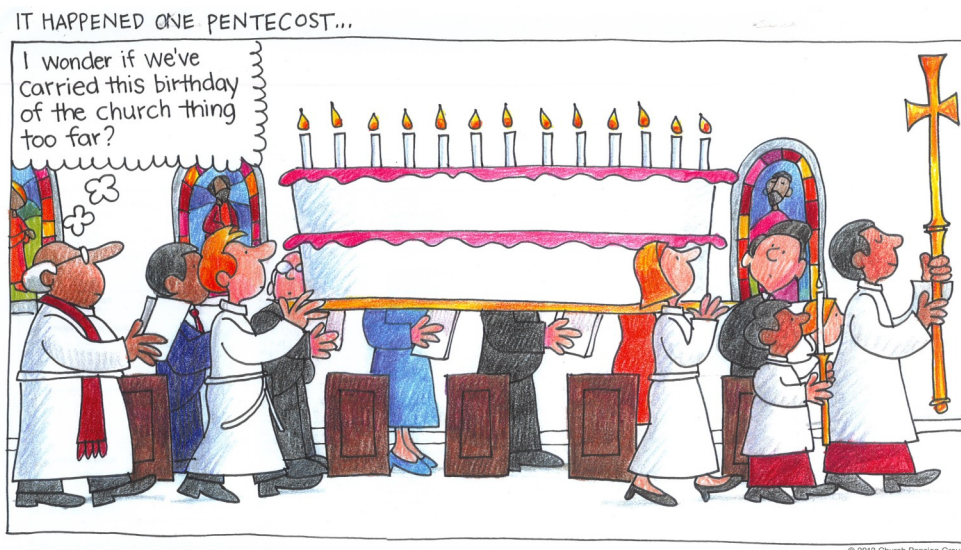
There were twenty-eight children registered for the four session program. At the first session fifteen registered children showed up plus ten not registered – Maui style!! There were about eight parents that participated. Several children registered from the homeless shelter and a good ethnic mix including Hawaiian, Chinese and Filipino ages were from three to eleven. Over half the attendance were six years or under.

There were five tables with small groups and several icebreakers so that the children moved from table to table a few times and were mixed-up with kids they didn't know. They introduced the team and then the kids introduced themselves to each other at their small group tables. We briefly discussed why books are written including sharing information, telling a story, making us laugh or teaching us a lesson. Each child got to create their own book made of card stock (4 pages) tied with yarn. Suggestions for titles to help them get started were put on the flip chart and reading buddies helped them come up with titles. Once they completed their covers, each child was given a prize and the kids went up to pick out books to read and take home. The reading buddies and parents talked to them about the books they selected and there was time to read. The session closed with a snack and each child took home two books. In later sessions they finished their own books and were delighted in having us read their books out loud. In addition, each small group made-up stories one sentence at a time. We wrote down these stories and gave them a copy the following week. Simple prizes like dolphin pencils, small coloring and activity books, stickers and happy face erasures were given as prizes about twice at each session.

The main theme of the reading program was to have FUN with reading. There was an emphasis on curiosity, the joy of exploring topics that really interested them, a sense of community with everyone working together. We strived to inspire them, not teach them. There were seven reading buddies from Good Shepherd parish including one teenager who let us know how different this was for the children. He said this generation is very passive and are used to watching TV for many hours a day. The reading buddies were terrific, four dynamic senior women, one teenager and one young couple! We had a certified teacher and author of a book on home schooling as the program facilitator.

We learned that kids can do amazing things !

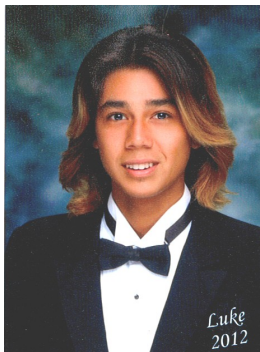

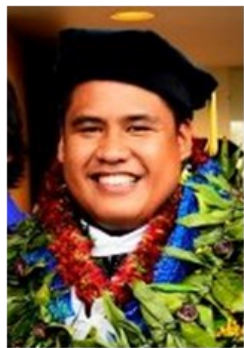

She knows that it is important that she trust the Lord with all her heart, use her gifts, give her life to Jesus the Lord, and always be a good example to others, respect yourself to be respected, and that will change her life. She wonders if others have actually felt God in their life. She wonders about the gifts given by the Spirit in Baptism and Confirmation and how many of us use these gifts to improve our lives and the lives of our family, church and community.

She was glad she attended HIM. "There is a big difference between knowing God and believing in God. I now know that running away from my problems is not a good idea. If I love God I can face my problems, even if it is the hardest thing to do."

# THOSE WHO SERVE CHRIST IN HIS CHURCH
